It was an early start for the chemists going to Strathclyde University on 13th September. We left at half eight enjoying a pleasant journey up trying to decipher Mrs Davidson's cryptic chocolate and sweet quiz.

We arrived and put our white coats and safety glasses on in their first year laboratories. After being given a brief safety talk we were straight to work. The Advanced Higher pupils were sent off to do really hard experiments while the Higher pupils set off to make slime and stalactites. The slime took a while to make but it was worth it when we ended up with something that looked like strawberry jelly. Luckily no one tried to eat it! Some things were unsuccessful but the students helping tried hard to make them work. We

After our experiments we were given a tour of the campus by some of the students. We saw the labs that the PhD students worked in, an NMR (nuclear magnetic resonance) machine that could work out what is in a substance by how it decays, and a machine that x-rays tiny crystals that balance on a hair-sized wire so you know their structure. We also passed by a forensics lab that we weren't allowed in because we might cause contamination.

Film Review: Welcome

Welcome, a recently released French movie, takes us on a special journey with 17 year old Bilal, a Kurd living in Northern France, awaiting the unlikely chance to illegally get to England and search for his beloved girlfriend. Bilal is caught up in this homeless atmosphere, paying hundreds to attempt to hide in lorries and vans through the Channel Tunnel, in just one of the desperate ways tried to get to the glorified Britain.

On meeting a swimming coach, Bilal seizes an opportunity to learn to swim and take on the Channel. From this moment on, we are attached to this gripping tale of real life and its downfalls. The inequities of our modern society are highlighted throughout while the simple humanity of individuals, such as Bilal's swimming coach, are shown vividly.

This swimming coach becomes a life coach for a vulnerable Bilal who is taken in and nurtured as if he were his child, coaching swimming, coaching life.

We are shown the areas where these homeless live. Disturbing yet beautiful cinema shows the brutalities of the police, while a



return to violent Nazism sits in the back of each and every captured viewer's mind.

This great film explores this young man's life, who is in the same position as thousands of other hopeful asylum seekers. The film's potency addresses the humanity in us all.

Wallace Hall Goes Green

Pupils have been taking steps to help the school become more 'green' and 'sustainable'. They have been carrying out a number of projects since Christmas.

Pupils in the Eco-Module have started work on a biodiversity garden in the small wooded area at the front of the school. They plan to create new habitats for birds and insects, a wild flower area,



a short nature walk and a small outdoor classroom that can be used by the nursery and primary pupils. Their work, so far, has been supported by a £250 Biodiversity Grant from Scottish Natural Heritage. Other module projects include calculating out the school's Global Footprint; gathering information on electricity and water use; and thinking of ways to reduce the school's waste. Waste reduction and recycling have also been targeted in a poster competition. Tilda Borrows (S2) won the competition and her poster is visible around the school.

The new polytunnel and allotment have been set-up and pupils have been out preparing the soil for some winter vegetables. It is hoped that the Biology pupils, Rural Skills and Duke of Edinburgh groups will grow plenty of vegetables that can be used by classes in Home Economics. This will help to reduce our food miles and promote organic gardening.

The garden bulb fundraiser has been very successful and pupils have raised over £200 towards equipment for the outdoor classroom (tools, seed trays and compost). We are also collecting Morrison's Let's Grow vouchers for further equipment and these can be handed in to the library for collection.

It is hoped that an environment group for junior pupils (S1-S3) will start up after the October holidays. Information will be issued during registration and assemblies. Anyone interested should see Mrs VanDyke for details.

Wallace Hall Academy Peer Mediation Project

All S1 and S6 pupils have been involved in peer mediation training sessions with Mike McKean from the Scottish Government's Positive Behaviour Team. These have been excellent opportunities for everyone to build their self-confidence and improve their communication skills.

From this training we now have a very encouraging 30 S6 and 12 S1 volunteers. Our volunteers are currently meeting on a weekly basis to prepare to begin peer mediation at Wallace Hall shortly after the October holiday. Peer mediators will listen to other pupils and deal with minor problems and disagreements. More information for pupils and parents will follow shortly.

Business Mentors – Would you like to join our innovative scheme?

For the past year, Wallace Hall Academy and its cluster primaries have been trialling an innovative method of expanding work-related learning experiences for pupils from P7 upwards. We have called this the Business Mentor scheme.

To date, 12 local business men and women, from young entrepreneurs to retired members of the community, have been matched with small groups of children and young people. Once a month, the mentors come into one of the schools in Mid-Nithsdale and work with their group on an individual basis. The aims of the scheme are to help these pupils gain an insight into the world of work, to assist them in developing and working towards their individual ca-

reer ideas and to give them positive role models

Wallace Hall Academy's innovative Queensberry Initiative took to the Showcase stage at the Scottish Learning Festival held in Glasgow at the SECC on Thursday 23 September. The Initiative had been invited to present information about its work to teachers and educationalists from all over Scotland at this annual event. QI were asked to present their unique slant on the outdoor classroom and partnership working with the community, at the invitation of the Outdoor Learning Team from Learning Teaching Scotland.

On the day, 10 pupils, selected from all year groups from S1-S6, travelled in the wee hours from Thornhill to get to Glasgow to deliver their presentation in the Learning Teaching Scotland village, right in the heart of the vast Festival. Pupils and staff were nervously scanning their notes as the minibus sped up the motorway. We got through the rush hour traffic just in time to set up the ICT part of the presentation in the central stage of the event. The half hour showcase began with a general introduction about the different aspects of the Initiative from the Queensberry Initiative staff team. Then our pupils were invited on the stage to talk about parts of the Initiative which they had been participating in, ranging from subject visits to Rural Skills and from targeted groups to our recent Rural Opportunities Day. All the pupils' presentations were well-received and the audience was particularly interested in the extensive photo montage which accompanied their talks,

which appeared on big screens all around the stage.

After our presentation, Festival participants from as far away as Denmark and as near as Dalbeattie came to talk to pupils and staff about the Initiative. Twinning Project by Jack Taylor and Thomas Wall




Wallace Hall Academy - Working Together to Achieve More

UWS Enterprise Challenge

On the 16th and 17th of September eight S5 pupils travelled to the Crichton Campus in Dumfries to take part in the University of West Scotland Schools Enterprise Challenge.

To prepare for the event the pupils had been asked to prepare a business concept based on the theme of 'Dumfries and Galloway on Wheels' for which they would then devise a marketing campaign. The pupils came up with the idea of a Dumfries-based tour bus to tap into the growing domestic tourist market. On the days pupils were allocated to different tasks with Harriet Meredith leading the group with Meyrick Harrison as second in command. Claire Nicolson and Patrick Farish produced a radio advert, Leanne Young and Erin McGinley staged press photographs and with help from the rest of the group Laura Roberts and Jamie Henderson wrote a press release. On Friday afternoon all of the participating schools were asked to present their idea and marketing campaign to a panel of judges. Although Wallace Hall missed out on winning the overall prize for the Challenge pupils were pleased to come away with a prize for the best radio advert.
